MORAL INJURY "Moral injury is the damage done to one's conscience · Within the context of military service, particularly regarding the experience of war, "moral or moral compass when that person perpetrates, injury" refers to the lasting witnesses, or fails to prevent emotional, psychological, acts that transgress one's own moral beliefs, values, or social, behavioral, and spiritual impacts of actions that violate ethical codes of conduct." a service member's core moral values and behavioral expectations of self or others (Litz et al., 2009). https://moralinjuryproject.syr.edu/about-moral-injury/
